



Today is the Feast of Pentecost which is one of the great feasts of the year. Though Easter and Passover have a relationship, and though Hanukah and Christmas sometimes overlap, Pentecost is the only Christian Feast to have grown directly out of a Jewish feast. The disciples were celebrating Pentecost at the first "Christian" Pentecost when the gift of the Holy Spirit was given. Pentecost is a Greek term meaning fiftieth. Today we celebrate Pentecost 7 weeks after Easter Sunday or on the 50th day inclusive of Easter Sunday. The Jewish people celebrate Pentecost on the 50th day after Passover. The Hebrew name for the feast is Shavuot. In English, it is usually called the Feast of Weeks. The Feast also celebrates the giving of the Torah (law or instruction) to Moses. The feast included all night Bible Studies. Pentecost was also a great pilgrimage festival in the Second Temple period, so people from India to Spain came to Jerusalem. While Passover was the major pilgrimage feast for those living in Israel, for those who lived at great distances, Pentecost was preferred. The weather was just much better for traveling later in the Spring. The weather is also the reason why Pentecost was the great baptismal feast in the Church of England. While Easter was preferred by most Christians, the weather in England could be very chilly in the early Spring (something New Englanders can have sympathy with). Baptismal fonts were often large enough to stand in, so the baptized would become very wet. It made sense to wait for the temperature to be more comfortable for such a joyous celebration. This coupling of the feast with baptism's white garments is probably the reason the feast became known as Whitsunday. Which was only officially changed in our communion in 1979.

Accessibility Project at St. John's

The Vestry recently voted unanimously to proceed with design work and a cost estimate to provide better accessibility to our church building. It has been a longstanding goal for St. John's for more than 10 years and a great deal of Vestry discernment has gone into this decision. We believe our faith, our desire to extend hospitality to everyone that comes through our doors, and our current financial strength have led us to this unique opportunity to improve accessibility and welcome all who visit our church.

Plans are almost done for improvements to both the upper and lower parking lot entrances to the church, the addition of two handicapped-accessible bathrooms on the sanctuary level, and a lift that allows handicapped access to church undercroft. DRAFT plans for the planned addition are available for viewing in St. Mary's Hall (on wall opposite the large bank of windows) and can also be seen electronically on our website. There will be a parish meeting on May 19 at 9:00 am (between services) in St. Mary's Hall to present and discuss project details.
